

# Plants for Fall Colour

## Perennials

- Anemone: white or pink flowers, blooms in late summer/early fall.
- Asters: come in a range of heights. Hardy fall flower.
- Astrantia: blooms from summer to fall.
- Astilbe 'Colour Flash Lime': limey foliage, pink plumes emerge in the fall.
- Chrysanthemum 'White Bomb': forms a mat, excellent ground cover.
- Cymbalaria Muralis (Kenilworth Ivy) :forms a mat, great ground cover that still look fresh in the fall.
- Echinacea (Cone Flower): late summer/fall bloomer.
- Fern 'Autumn Fern': orange foliage in the fall.
- Heuchera 'Venus': silver/green foliage provides a contrast in the fall garden.
- Ligularia: tall spikes of yellow flowers really take off in the late summer/fall.
- Penstemon: beautiful red foliage with tall plume of red flowers in Sept/Oct.
- Primula: certain varieties will bloom in the fall.
- Rudbeckia 'Black Eyed Susans': beautiful yellow flowers in late summer/early fall.
- Sedum 'Autumn Joy': shows its true beauty in the fall. Pink flowers cover the plant and attract butterflies.
- Tiarella: trailing/spreading foliage really takes off in the late summer.
- Feather Reed Grass: tall grass plume rise above the foliage in the fall.
- Other Perennial Grasses: most grasses look good in the fall with the plumes adding height in the garden.

## Shrubs

- Burning Bush: a true fall classic. Brilliant red foliage emerges in the fall.
- Chokecherry 'Autumn Magic': dark purple berries in late summer are complimented with emergent red foliage in the fall.
- Cotoneaster: low growing, great for embankments or walls. Produces copious red berries in the fall.
- Dogwood 'Red Osier': bright red bark is revealed as shrub defoliates in the fall.
- Hydrangea: several hydrangea, like Endless Summer Series, will bloom into late summer/early fall.
- Ninebark 'Coppertina': red- purple foliage becomes more pronounced in the fall. Excellent contrast plant.
- Amur Maple: a shrub form maples species. Foliage turns bright red in the fall.
- Japanese Maple 'Waterfall': short tree (max height 10') with horizontally cascading growth habit that give the plant its name. Foliage turns bright orange-red in the fall.
- Serviceberry: native to Newfoundland. Produces purple berries in late summer and red foliage in the fall.
